# **COLLABORATION**

### Faith-Based Family Advocacy Project



With grant support from SFF, Partners for Children South L.A. (PCSLA), in partnership with local Catholic Parishes, implemented the Faith-Based Family & Early Childhood Advocacy Project. Using PCSLA's Early Childhood System of Care, Parish families with children from birth to 5 years have access to quality services from PCSLA's eight partner agencies, as well as enhanced care coordination from the Project Manager/Family Advocate.

Through long-term case management/relationship development, the Family Advocate seeks to increase family participation in the Parish community and school, with a goal to increase the number of children accessing services; social services, health, early childhood and parent education, and Catholic education. Since the launch of this project in September 2018, 15 families have been provided with support in accessing 33 services.

# **EXPLORATION**

## Safe Place for Youth Housing Initiative

There are approximately 243 documented homeless youth on the Westside each night. The lack of available housing programs for transitional youth and young adults in West Los Angeles has been the greatest challenge in helping young people achieve stability. To combat this, Safe Place for Youth (SPY) has launched several interim housing programs.

With grant support from Specialty Family Foundation, SPY hired a Housing Program Manager to establish and oversee new housing resources for their youth, including rapid re-housing, crisis, bridge and transitional housing that were either inaccessible to young people or unresponsive to their needs. This being the Foundation's first ever Poverty and Community Intervention (PCI) programmatic grant, it is an opportunity for us to learn as we strategically look ahead toward new exploration opportunities across all program areas.

- <u>Homeboy Industries</u> to provide executive leadership training to current employees who were former clients, consistent with their mission of promoting from within.
- Brittingham Social Enterprise Lab at the USC Marshall School of Business to conduct a Social Venture Competition for solutions on combating the issue of homelessness in Los Angeles.
- Archdiocese of Los Angeles Catholic Schools Marketing and Media Campaign; Infinite Value, Limitless Possibilities





# INNOVATION

# Replicating, Studying 21st Century Personalized Learning Model

2018 was a landmark year for Specialty Family Foundation's investment in personalized learning models (AKA "Blended Learning"). Specialty Family Foundation was an inaugural funder to assist inner-city Catholic schools in converting to these 21st Century data-rich, growth-catalyzing approaches. From 2013-15, as a pioneer investor in the space, SFF helped build a cohort of three award-winning schools with the nationally celebrated blended learning network, Seton Education Partners Following on these successes, SFF worked with Loyola Marymount University (LMU) to help found the iDEAL Institute in 2015 with a goal of creating local capacity for studying and scaling these proven approaches that aim to personalize nearly every aspect of the learning experience to each child's learning level and style. To date, SFF has worked with its partners to convert more than eight schools into Blended Learning schools, with more on the way. In 2018, with our partners at the iDEAL Institute, SFF was proud to assist in adding St. Raphael and Blessed Sacrament schools in joining the ranks of schools that have converted to these models, with Guardian Angel School's grant approved to begin in 2019. Perhaps most exciting: It's working! Check out the Phase 2 Third Party Evaluation Report released on this work in September 2018!

- Director of STEM Curriculum at the Los Angeles Archdiocese Department of Catholic Schools
- Financial Bookkeeping Pilot in 4 low-income serving schools in the LA Archdiocese
- CodeRevKids delivers weekly computer coding lessons to 1st - 8th graders at eight low income serving Catholic schools
- St. Patrick Catholic Elementary School implemented a Dual Language Immersion curriculum
- San Gabriel Pastoral Region Catholic Schools Initiative focuses on increasing enrollment, access and quality in 7 low incoming serving schools
- St. Odilia 2nd graders are learning how to program robots through participation in the USC Viterbi School of Engineering BOTS program.




